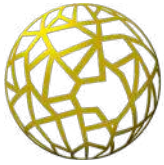

For more than 15 years Every Home for Christ has been assisting the poor in Malawi and Zambia through the provision of funds, training, monitoring and evaluating the work, constantly changing and adapting to the needs of the communities as we assess what is working and what needs to change. been able to train farmers and provide seed, fertiliser, wells and toilets, as well as increasing skills and income. This has brought great joy to the lives of village men, women and children, providing security for their future!

The impact of this Food and Income Security Program in Zambia and Malawi has been to improve family food security, improve the ability to earn income, improve health and provide for orphans under 5 years of age. A Covid-safe plan was in place.

zambia community development

1,698 men, women and children saw their lives improve and an evaluation of this project discovered that through the savings and loan groups, through the pass-on program of pigs, ducks and chickens and through home gardens and nutrition training, the women now have a sustainable income source to help them care for and educate their children.

Challenges were long dry spells, a worm infestation, unstable currency levels, cost of vehicle maintenance and government restrictions due to Covid-19. In spite of this, the maize yield increased by 67.7% and enough maize was able to be stored as a food source for another twelve months. Eating 3 meals a day, wells, toilets and mosquito nets all resulted in improved health.

malawi community development

Over the last 12 months an emphasis has been on improving the health of the community, specifically targeting families who are caring for the elderly, orphans and the disabled, including covid-19 education.

2,100 people attended training in sanitation and hygiene and soap making was included as one of the many income generating activities. 12 water wells were built along with 10 Eco-San toilets (to assist the disabled), 300 mud toilets, 300 rubbish pits, 300 kitchens, 300 plate dryers and

300 clothes dryers to improve hygiene. As a result, there was a reduction of malaria, diarrhea, cholera and bilharzia. 500 families received mosquito nets, child protection clubs for 140 children were formed and 2,100 men and women agreed to undergo HIV/AIDS testing and counselling.

Lives Changed

Before the project Chizumba village in **Malawi** was found by the local government to be one of the villages who had stunted and malnourished children of under five years of age, due to a lack of education on how to use locally available food resources, lack of land to cultivate and children only receiving 2 food groups once a day.



Malawi EHC started intensive training on nutrition and how to cook balanced meals. At the same time parents were given seed and taught how to grow a variety of vegetables in village gardens and how to improve their maize crops. A Feeding Centre was built where family members brought their orphaned children under 5 for porridge every day and activities with other children where they learnt about hygiene and sanitation. If a child was found to be malnourished he or she was referred to the local NRU (Nutrition Rehabilitation Unit) where the child was monitored and treated accordingly and this also helped to reduce cases of malnutrition amongst children in the village.



Unfortunately all the Feeding Centres had to be closed down for a period in 2020 due to the Coronavirus pandemic.



Children and babies are at great risk of contracting Malaria due to the prevalence of mosquitoes, particularly at dusk. In **Zambia** mosquito nets were given to families with young children resulting in the number of malaria cases in one village dropping from 20 to 8 in just 3 months because 2,194 people were sleeping under treated nets.

Lives Changed

Evaluation



One lesson learned in Malawi and Zambia was that, even with limited funding and fluctuating exchange rates, people's lives could still be changed through the pass-on program of cassava cuttings and the offspring of pigs, ducks and chickens which had been bought in earlier years, resulting in long-term sustainability.

Evaluations are an important part of the program of Every Home Global Concern so that we can learn lessons from the field for future planning. Every 3 months the project manager sends a report of progress with suggestions for improvement and at the end of the 3-5 year program an independent evaluation is organised. In the last year funds from the Australian government have not been available for **Malawi and Zambia** so our staff in the field had to evaluate what were the most important aspects of the work and find economical ways to resource these, sometimes for free from government or other NGO resources. A 2020 independent evaluation of the Zambia program found that the most significant factor that has determined the efficiency of the project is the formation of village project committees and the training of lead farmers to implement the project and train/supervise other farmers. The Coronavirus was a challenge which reduced the numbers of meetings held so some training took place in homes.

An evaluation in **Bangladesh** of the state of the primary school buildings showed the need for repairs to existing buildings and highlighted the importance of Bangladesh owning its own buildings rather than renting. This is an ongoing need.

In **India**, an evaluation of the Community Development program showed the need for further development activity and funding from Microsoft USA has been resourced so that the school can include training in computer skills, both for the staff and for the children.

The value of lessons learned is that it leads to improvement, both in the project itself, but also in the impact being made in the lives of the poor.

The Community Development program in India has continued despite the restrictions of the Covid pandemic (report on next page). 161 children were educated in the past 12 months with just over 50% being girls. All children graduated to the next class. Apart from the Project Manager, School Principal and 8 teaching staff, 9 or 10 local men and women find employment in the school as bookkeepers, cleaners, bus drivers, security guards and cooks. A new computer training program initiated by Microsoft USA is to be introduced in the school once the pandemic is over which will provide the study material, modules, train the teachers (who will be our own staff) and provide Tutor Certificates from Microsoft to the teachers. They will also provide all required computers and necessary equipment ... a wonderful asset to the school program.

The Love Anupampattu program also conducts a 6 months tailoring course for 30 women a year where women learn both tailoring and embroidery skills. One class works from the school premises and another class is trained in the community hall built after the Tsunami. Many of the graduates find work in an export company and the others use our project centre machines to earn enough money to be eligible under the EHC 50% saving scheme to receive their own sewing machine, a wonderful achievement for previously unskilled women; their pride in this achievement has been immense!



Bangladesh

The Community Development program in Bangladesh includes 3 schools and vocational training centres in Dhaka and one in a country area. Over many years these schools have educated about 1,000 children each year - from extremely poor families (mostly from the slum areas) and enabled the women to gain a skill in sewing and earn some money. Many of the children have progressed to higher education and become engineers, doctors and government workers or are working in other professional positions. The schools set a good standard and almost all children passed the government-set exams this year. Girls are especially targeted so that they have the opportunity to be educated, as are the children of rickshaw pullers and the unemployed. Three parent/teacher days are held each year. Over the last year 230 women were trained in sewing skills, with 40 receiving their own machine, and 30 men were helped to own their own rickshaw or van, enabling them to escape from the payment of exorbitant rental fees and, in many cases, to move out of the slums.

Bangladesh school and office staff working together to help the families of the school children with basic necessities for survival.



The 5 EHC schools in Bangladesh and India were forced to close down for some months in 2020 due to a Coronavirus lockdown in their countries as the virus rapidly spread and hundreds died. However, Australia EHC decided to continue sending their monthly budgets given by child sponsors so that the staff could be paid and some help given to the families of the school children.

In Bangladesh, at considerable risk to their own safety, the staff went out and bought basic necessities such as food, soap and face masks and delivered them to the families of the school children. Each month all families in the Bangladesh & India primary schools were visited by their teachers with school work for the children and continuation of their education.

One of the Grade 5 children from Bangladesh wrote -

"I am studying in grade five in the EHC school. My father is a day labourer. He also worked in other fields. We have to live in extreme poverty. It hurts a lot to look at the family around us, but when I look at my father, I feel proud because father earns money by working hard. Our family survives on my father's little income. Now the whole world is terrified of the Corona virus attack. This has had the same effect in Bangladesh due to which our area has been locked down. It's been a month and we are not allowed to go out of the house. We were borrowing money from the family next

door. Now people can no longer give money or food because they are in the same situation. The day our family received the relief packet from EHC there was no food in our family. So that day my father disobeyed the lockdown and went out in search of food in the fire of hunger but father failed and came back. Father came home and saw our smiling faces and he couldn't understand. Mum told father that God heard our prayer today. Bangladesh Every Home Contact has provided rice, pulses, oil, salt, face masks & soap to our family. My Father was very happy to hear. He also smiled happily and he cried."

Ethiopia

2020 was an eventful year for Eloi Ministries as, after much paperwork and setting up of policies and procedures, it gained NGO status in Ethiopia.

In all of its 9 prisons it is introducing a 50% scheme where, instead of a "handout" in the prisons, the prisons themselves are being asked to contribute 50% of the cost of the project and Setatow Befekadu and a team of supporters visited 6 of the 9 prisons to evaluate progress and to introduce the 50% scheme.

Some of the skills being taught in the prisons are tailoring, weaving, hairdressing, welding, handcrafts, wood-work, metal-work and brick making, allowing them to generate an income while in prison as well as upon release.

Debrebrhan Prison embraced the scheme and Eloi Ministries was able to donate a bakery machine so that prisoners are learning a new skill and enjoying fresh bread.

As the children of prisoners go to prison with their parents, one of the issues being addressed by Eloi Ministries is the lack of education for these children. Assela Prison agreed to rebuild a school for the children, paying 50% of the cost.

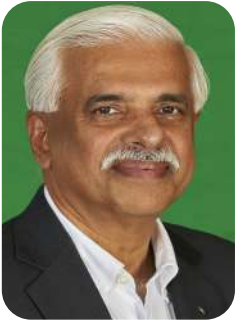
Durame Prison has already built a school in partnership with a High School in Sydney and the school principal agreed to pay 50% of new toilets, a TV set and DVD player for the Kindergarten. The inauguration ceremony for the school was held during the visit and new books were donated to the school.

In Ambo Prison, Eloi donated soap and used clothes for male and female inmates and their children.

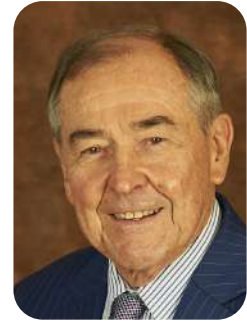

MAKING SENSE OF THE NUMBERS ...

There was total revenue of \$1.55 million as there were no Australian Government aid grants for the year. After adjusting for this, the income has still been in line with previous years (excluding aid grants), despite the challenging covid-19 environment. Funds of \$902,000 were directly channelled overseas to support ministry and community development and a positive result was the net profit of \$38,000 for the year. The Sydney office building was revalued upwards in the 2020 year to \$1.68M, to more accurately reflect its current market value.

Every Home Global Concern satisfies the requirements of the Australian Charities and not-for-profits commission Act and meets the standards set by the Australian Charities Commission.

Report from the Board Chairman:

2020 has been a year we can't forget, starting with fires and floods and continuing to be a year like no other with the Coronavirus pandemic affecting not only our office but the work we support in many countries of the world. We report with gladness that none of our staff have been affected by the virus and, even with the closing of the office and the staff working from home where possible, we have been able to continue in our work. We are grateful to the Australian government for their financial help through Jobkeeper and income supplements but the real joy has come through the faithful support and gifts from the many men and women who have been "one" with us for many, many years. As a Board of Directors, we are extremely grateful for your faithfulness.
